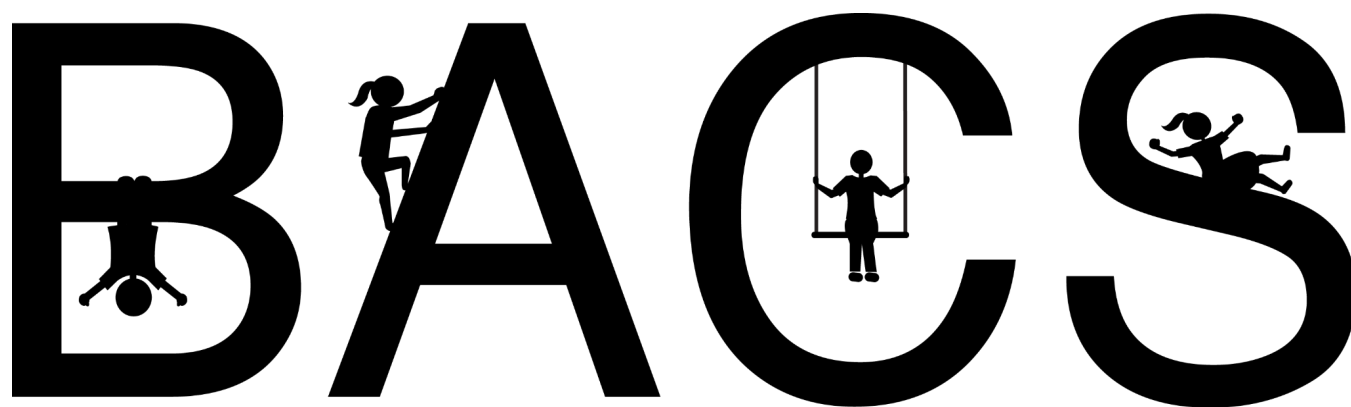

## OUR SCHOOL

Brentwood Adventist Christian School is a combined effort of the Bismarck, Mandan, and Dakota Adventist Academy Seventh-day Adventist churches. This school has been in continuous existence since the 1950's. It is authorized by the State of North Dakota and is accredited by the Mid America Union Conference Department of Education and by the Board of Regents of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventist.

Brentwood Adventist Christian School is located 1.5 miles north of the intersection of Highway 83 and Highway 1804, in Bismarck. Brentwood Adventist Christian School continues to serve as a private school for grades K-8.

## OUR PURPOSE

- To provide a balanced training of the physical, intellectual, spiritual, and social talents of each pupil.
- To see that scholastic standards are maintained at the level required by the Board of Education of the State of North Dakota, the K-12 Board for the Mid-America Union Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, and the Department of Education of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.

## ADMINISTRATION

### **Authority**

The school board will give direction and oversee the operation of the school.

School board members are elected by the constituent churches and are responsible to the same.

The educational officers of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in the Dakota Conference, Mid-America Union Conference, and General Conference are relied upon for advice and counsel.

Disciplinary problems brought before the school board in session will be confined to those requested by the head teacher.

No individual member of the board has the privilege of making decisions affecting school policies.

## ADMISSIONS POLICY

Brentwood Adventist Christian School does not discriminate based on race, color, national, or ethnic origin in administration of its educational policies, admissions policies, and other school administered programs.

### **Who May Attend**

Brentwood Adventist Christian School welcomes applications from families who desire a balanced elementary Christian education for their children. Age of student, health, capacity for learning, and mental/emotional stability will be taken into consideration. Membership in the Seventh-day Adventist Church is not required.

## **Application Procedure**

Students will be considered for school enrollment by the school board after applications have been received. The following items are required to be considered an enrolled student at Brentwood:

- Completed application form
- Proof of Age
- Immunization records
- All forms signed in enrollment packet

## **First Grade Admission**

In accordance with North Dakota Law, students entering first grade must be 6 by August 1st unless developmental and academic readiness can be proven, or the child has been enrolled in another approved program.

## **FINANCIAL INFORMATION**

Brentwood Adventist Christian School charges an enrollment fee and a yearly tuition.

### **Enrollment Fee**

The enrollment fee of \$250 is due at registration time and is non-refundable. There is an additional \$75 late registration fee. This fee includes student insurance, textbook rental, workbooks, and most field trips. The student is responsible for all other personal classroom supplies.

### **Tuition**

Yearly tuition for a family is charged as follows:

- First child: \$2,819
- Second child: \$2,720
- Third Child: \$2,537

A 3% discount is given when the entire year's tuition is paid at registration.

Tuition must be held current as agreed to at school registration. Tuition will be divided into 10 monthly payments. The first month's tuition payment is due at registration. Each following payment is due the 7th of each month, if paid after the 7th there will be a \$20 late fee. Both monthly tuition and late fee needs to be paid by the next billing cycle or will accumulate more late fees. At 30 days delinquent, the account will go to the financial committee for further action (including but not limited to meeting with the family, removal of student, ...)

To register for the following school year, a family's account from the previous year must be paid in full. Parents/guardians have the responsibility to contact the teacher, treasurer, school board chair, or church pastor of their financial situation. All financial agreements need to be submitted to the treasurer by registration day.

### **Financial Aid**

Families may contact the Brentwood school board chairman or treasurer if financial aid is needed. Seventh-day Adventist families may apply for any needed financial assistance through their church. Constituent church families may apply first through their church and then may also apply for additional assistance through the Bismarck Education Endowment Fund (B.E.E.F). All financial aid arrangements must be in place prior to registration.

## **Fundraising/Participation**

Brentwood Adventist Christian School is a small school.

- Families and students are expected to contribute to the efforts of fundraising. It is an integral part of our effort to improve the education experience (i.e. outdoor school), the facilities, and it benefits our school as a whole.
- As we have few staff it is expected of families to participate in work bees, school events, field trip transportation and supervision, outreach projects, etc.

## **SCHOOL REGULATIONS**

Brentwood Adventist Christian School follows the teachings and policies of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

### **School Hours**

School hours are Monday-Thursday from 8am to 4:15pm and no school on Fridays.

Students should arrive no earlier than 30 minutes before school begins and be picked up no later than 30 minutes after school dismisses.

### **Attendance**

Regular attendance is required. Please plan ahead if your child needs to be absent from school. No student is permitted to leave the school grounds during the day without permission from the parent/guardian and teacher.

### **Diet**

The school promotes healthy living and the benefits of a vegetarian diet or the use of clean meats as mentioned in Leviticus 11. Parents should plan to send a nutritious lunch with their child/children each day. By minimizing the amount of sugar intake, you may greatly increase student concentration in the classroom. Drinks containing caffeine are not to be brought to school. Because of differing family dietary preferences, students are not to share or trade lunches.

Food brought to share should be discussed with the teacher/head teacher in advance for both foreknowledge and so allergies are accounted for. Food brought to share with the class should be vegetarian.

### **School Functions and Field trips**

Students are expected to conduct themselves according to all school guidelines during any school function held after regular school hours or in any other location. Field trip shirts are to be worn unless otherwise directed by the teacher/head teacher.

### **Supervision**

Supervision on the playground is not provided before or after school hours. Students will remain in the classroom until school begins or until their ride arrives, respectively. Please make prior arrangements when the need arises for extended time at school.

### **Telephone**

The school telephone is provided for business use only and is not to be used except with permission from the teacher. Parents should avoid calling the school during school hours except in an emergency.

### **Cell Phones**

Teachers/staff are permitted to have personal cell phones on their person, as much of school communication with parents is done on their own phones.

Students are permitted to have cell phones on the premises. All sounds and notifications should be turned off and should not be seen unless pre-approved. The school is not liable for any lost, stolen, or damaged electronics that are brought to school.

### **Transportation**

All transportation to and from school is the responsibility of the parent/guardian. Any changes in regular transportation from school must be prearranged and the teacher must be notified.

Transportation for field trips will be arranged by the school.

### **Visitors**

All visitors must be approved by the head teacher in advance. Visitors must comply with the guidelines of Brentwood Adventist Christian School. Those wanting to volunteer at the school while students are present will submit to a background check prior to service as required by the Dakota Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.

## **CONDUCT & DISCIPLINE**

The privilege of students attending Brentwood Adventist Christian School rests on the willingness of the student and their parent/guardian to cooperate with teacher(s) in maintaining good discipline and making sure that sound education policies and relationships will be practiced in accordance with the following Christian standards of conduct:

1. Respect God and His Word.
2. Respect and obey those in authority.
3. Respect for others: their rights and property.
4. Respect for yourself.

### **Parent/Guardian Concerns**

If a parent/guardian is concerned with an action of a teacher, please withhold judgment until the issue can be discussed with the teacher and/or head teacher. If no satisfaction is realized, the parent/guardian should contact the school board chairperson, who will meet with the involved parties and attempt to solve the problem. The chairperson may call in the education superintendent and other school board members, if needed, to resolve the conflict or problem. The complainant(s) must present their concern(s) to the school board chairperson at least 48 hours before the school board meeting. Please refer to the church agenda for the day/time of the next school board meeting – generally the 2nd Monday of each month.

We strongly encourage students, parent/guardians, teachers, and school board members to follow the general principles found in Matthew 18:15-16 for resolving conflict:

*Moreover, if your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone. If he hears you, you have gained your brother.*

*But if he will not hear you, take with you one or two more, that "by the mouth of two or three witnesses every word may be established."*

--Matthew 18:15-16 (NKJV)

### **Conduct and Behavior Guidelines**

Our students are often in the public eye, whether on a field trip, providing a community service, or interacting with approved school visitors. It is our intention that our students always present a positive first and lasting impression.

## **Dress Code**

The dress code is to be followed at all times unless authorized by the teacher/head teacher (e.g. Christmas party, spirit week, etc).

Collared knit shirts are considered the school “uniform” and are required for Brentwood students (Polo-style: solid color or stripes preferred). Clothing should be clean and presentable. All clothing should be in good repair (e.g. no rips, holes or tears, even when skin is not showing), at the teacher’s discretion.

Field trip t-shirts will be provided at the beginning of the school year by Home and School. If a student outgrows it during the year please trade it in. Field trip T-shirts need to be turned in at the end of the school year.

Clothing, accessories, items, and themes that are not permitted, but not limited to, include:

- shows bare midriffs
- sleeveless or low-cut
- sheer or see through
- inappropriate slogans/pictures
- extremely tight or loose fitting
- skirts or shorts that are shorter than two inches above the knee
- tv/movie, game character, and brand logo themes
- Pajamas, lounge pants/shorts

Make-up, nail polish, and hair coloring should look natural. Jewelry is not to be worn to school or school functions.

Wearable Electronics (e.g. smart watches, fitness trackers) are to be used as a watch only. All notifications and sounds need to be off. The school is not liable for any lost, stolen, or damaged electronics brought to school.

## **Student Behavior**

The following is expected of all students:

- Student behavior should uphold the religious ideals of faith promoted by the school.
- Students’ words and actions should be respectful to the teacher, other students, and school volunteers (lewd words or actions and purposeful defiance will not be tolerated).
- Honesty is expected throughout all school interactions including classwork, examinations, and discussions regarding inappropriate behavior.
- All school and personal property should be cared for and should not be used inappropriately or when permission is not granted.
- General rule: Hands off! – If it’s not yours, don’t touch it!

## **Harassment/ Bullying**

Harassment of any student by another student or staff or other person under the supervision of the school is unacceptable and prohibited. We consider it the responsibility of staff, and parents to work together to ensure a positive and spiritual school culture. Any teacher, adult, or student who hears or sees behavior that they feel is inappropriate by a teacher, adult, or student toward another teacher, adult, or student should intervene in a kind, Christ-like manner and when necessary, consult with the teacher in a timely manner. Guiding students into habits of self-control and self-discipline is the ultimate goal of the school’s efforts.

All disciplinary measures will include an appeal to the spiritual sensibilities of students and be administered in an atmosphere of prayer, kind, and courteous discourse. Consequences will be

determined by the severity of the offense, by the frequency of occurrence, and level of remorse exhibited.

The following behaviors undermine the desired school culture and are considered unacceptable:

- Verbal harassment – including, but not limited, to name calling, racial slurs, put-downs, ‘roasting,’ or any comment that marginalizes the dignity of another
- Physical contact that hurts or has the potential for hurting another person – including, but not limited to pushing, kicking, hitting, tripping, etc.
- Threats made verbally, in writing or online, explicit or implied, which suggests physical, or emotional harm to another person
- Comments, discussions, visual depictions of subject matter that is uncomplimentary to Christian values
- Violating published or announced school rules of conduct considered necessary for the harmonious function of school - in the building, on the school grounds, or on school-sponsored, off-campus events
- Any activity that compromises or has the potential to jeopardize the welfare and safety of persons or property
- Overt rebelliousness and insubordination

Bullying, hazing, harassment, menacing, intimidation or any act that injures, degrades, disgraces or renders a student fearful will not be tolerated.

Specific forms of bullying include, but are not limited to;

- Verbal e.g. name calling, teasing abuse, putdowns, sarcasm, insults and threats
- Physical e.g. hitting, punching, kicking, scratching, tripping, spitting
- Social e.g. ignoring, ostracizing, alienating, making inappropriate gestures
- Psychological e.g. spreading rumors, dirty looks, hiding or damaging possessions

### **Cyberbullying**

(Adopted from [www.stopbullying.gov](http://www.stopbullying.gov)) Cyberbullying is bullying that takes place using electronic technology. Electronic technology includes devices and equipment such as cell phones, computers, and tablets as well as communication tools including social media sites, text messages, chat, and websites. Examples of cyberbullying include mean text messages or emails, rumors sent by email or posted on social networking sites, and embarrassing pictures, videos, websites or fake profiles.

### **Weapons**

Students shall not bring, possess, conceal or use a weapon on school property or at school sponsored activities. Students should not even pretend to play with or be in possession of weapons. A dangerous weapon means any weapon, device, instrument, material, or substance, which under the circumstances in which it is used, attempted to be used or threatened to be used, is readily capable of causing death or serious physical injury. Any student who gives evidence of possession, or use of a weapon on or about the school premises or at any school sponsored activity will be suspended immediately from school and recommended for expulsion for no less than one year. Replicas of weapons, fireworks, bullets or pocket knives are also prohibited. Exceptions to this prohibition may be granted only with the head teachers prior approval for certain curriculum or school-related activities. Prohibited weapons, replicas of weapons, fireworks, bullets, and pocket knives are subject to seizure or forfeiture.

### **Threat of Violence**

Threats of violence involving firearms or weapons made by students to other students or to school employees are to be taken seriously and will be dealt with in a determined manner. Parents will be notified and there may be a need for possible police involvement. Appropriate discipline might

include suspension, expulsion, or possible reference to law enforcement, depending on the nature and severity of the threats.

Teachers shall discuss this policy with their students in an age-appropriate way. Any student who engages in harassment shall be subject to disciplinary action up to and including dismissal.

### **Sexual Harassment**

BACS is committed to providing a school environment free from sexual harassment for all students. Incidents of harassment should be reported in accordance with those procedures so school authorities may take appropriate action. Students who sexually harass others are subject to discipline up to and including dismissal. Employees who engage in sexual harassment are subject to termination.

Definition: Sexual harassment is unwelcome sexual advances or requests and other conduct of a sexual nature which is offensive. It can be spoken, written, or physical behavior. It includes offensive pictures, graffiti and jokes, and gestures. If submission to sexual conduct is made a condition of academic status, progress, benefits, honors, or activities it is prohibited sexual harassment. Sexual harassment also occurs when the offensive behavior or material creates a hostile school environment. Reporting Procedures: Students who have experienced sexual harassment shall report the incident to school authorities as soon as possible. If the harassment is between students, the student shall report the incident to the classroom teacher(s) in grades K-8. The student may also report to their pastor or any member of the school board. If the harassment comes from an adult, the student should report directly to the head teacher or another responsible adult.

### **Prohibited Items**

The following items are not permitted:

- Obscene or otherwise inappropriate literature, pictures, or articles.
- Tobacco, alcohol, illegal drugs or narcotics in any form. Possession or distribution to others will be reported to the appropriate authorities.
- Trading cards, playing cards, or any other gambling devices.
- Any type of weapons, firearms, or knives (including toys).
- Electronic games or gaming devices.
- Items displaying tv/movie, and game characters

### **Discipline**

The school board has designated the head teacher/teacher(s) responsible for interpretation and enforcement of school rules and regulations. Certain actions (such as violent or illegal behavior) by a student may result in an immediate suspension and/or alerting the proper authorities if deemed necessary.

Appropriate disciplinary actions by the teacher may include any one, or a combination, of the following: taking away privileges (such as free time or other activities); time out; separation from other students; before or after school detention; light chores; or other tasks as deemed appropriate.

Parent(s)/guardian(s) will be kept informed throughout the disciplinary process. This may include notes being sent home (by way of paper, email, text, or phone call), additional parent-teacher conferences, meetings between the parent/guardian, teacher, head teacher, and student where a written behavior plan may be developed, and additional meetings where school board or conference personnel will be involved in the discussion and decision making process. In extreme

cases, suspension may be considered with expulsion being a last resort if behavior does not improve.

## COMPUTER/INTERNET USE POLICY & PERMISSION

Brentwood Adventist Christian School (BACS) has provided its students with the opportunity to learn about the use and function of computers and to use them as tools in the process of learning in other areas of the curriculum.

BACS has sought to provide the safest possible environment for the learning process. This includes the right to reasonably grant or restrict the use of computers and/or the internet as necessary. Parents and guardians of minors are responsible for establishing constructive standards of use for their children when using any media or information sources.

The BACS computer network and stations are not for private or personal use and the following rules apply:

- No email, messaging, social networking or chat will be allowed or available.
- No personalizing or changing of settings on any station by students is permitted.
- Damaging hardware or physically disconnecting any part of the system is not permitted.
- Any program, web page or site will be open for all to see.
- No portable electronic devices from home will be allowed to be connected to the network.
- Computers will not be used for entertainment or filling time.
- Gaming is not permitted unless it is part of the curriculum.
- Teachers and parents/guardians have the right to view personal files at any time.
- Personal respect in all computer related activities is expected.
- No copying of another's work, copying work off the internet, or copyright violations are allowed.
- All school regulations, rules of respect, and department apply.
- Internet use will only be granted by and in the presence of the teacher or another designated adult.

Any violation of these rules will result in partial to total loss of computer/internet privileges and can result in suspension. Parents and teachers have the right at any time to revoke a student's access and use privileges and permissions.

It is the student's responsibility to immediately report any inappropriate sites, content, or abuse of the system.

## POLICY ON ILLEGAL DRUGS, ALCOHOL, AND NICOTINE

### Our Goals

1. Reduce Substance Use: Actively work to lower the incidence of nicotine, alcohol, and illegal drugs in North Dakota.
2. Health and Safety: Protect the well-being of all students, employees, and the public.
3. Positive Role Modeling: Encourage staff to lead by example and abstain from illegal drugs, alcohol, and nicotine.

Note: Tobacco is a leading cause of preventable death and disability in North Dakota.

## Prohibition on Campus

- **Strict No-Use Policy:** Usage of nicotine, alcohol, and illegal drugs is forbidden on school property, in vehicles on school trips, and by anyone present on campus, including visitors and family members.
- **No Advertisement:** Advertising these substances, including clothing that promotes them, is not permitted. Accepting gifts from industries promoting such items is also prohibited.

## Drug Education

- **Curriculum Integration:** Education about harmful substances will be part of the K-8 health curriculum, focusing on health risks and social consequences.
- **Teacher Training:** Educators responsible for drug prevention education will receive specialized training for effective material delivery.

## Communication of Policy

- **Handbooks and Signs:** This policy will be included in employee and student handbooks and visibly posted in the school.
- **Parental and Official Notification:** Parents will receive written notification, and the policy will be communicated via official school publications.

## Enforcement and Cessation

### A. Students (Grades K-8)

- **First Offense:** Confiscation, parental conference, meeting with a substance abuse educator or staff, and potential police involvement.
- **Second Offense:** All first offense actions plus 1- hour detention with a drug prevention component.

### B. Faculty/Staff

Faculty and staff, including administrators, teachers, secretaries, clerks, teacher assistants, cafeteria workers, bus drivers, and others, are subject to the following consequences for policy violations:

- **First Offense:** A verbal warning will be issued, emphasizing the importance of adhering to school policies. The staff member will be referred to cessation services for support in overcoming substance use.
- **Second Offense:** A formal approach with a written warning that will be documented in the employee's personnel file. Additionally, the staff member will be directed to drug prevention services to reinforce the seriousness of the violation and provide further assistance.
- **Third Offense:** This level of violation will be considered insubordination and will trigger formal disciplinary procedures as outlined in the school's employment policies. This includes suspension and potential dismissal, depending on the severity and circumstances of the offense.

## C. Visitors

Visitors, including parents and guests, are required to comply with the school's substance use policy:

- **Policy Adherence:** All visitors are expected to respect the school's commitment to a drug-free environment. The use of tobacco products, alcohol, or illegal drugs is strictly prohibited.
- **Enforcement Protocol:** If a visitor is observed violating the policy, they will be politely asked to cease their actions and respect the school rules. If the individual fails to comply, they may be directed to leave the school property. Repeated violations or serious infractions will result in a formal ban from the school premises.

## D. Cessation Aids Policy:

BACS allows the use of nicotine cessation aids, such as patches or gum, by staff and visitors, provided their use is discreet, not visible to students, and reported to the administration for transparency and support.

## Definitions

- **Tobacco Products:** For this policy, tobacco includes but is not limited to cigarettes, cigars, cigarillos, pipes, e-cigarettes, blunts, bidis, clove cigarettes, and other similar products. It also encompasses all forms of smokeless tobacco, such as dip, chew, and snuff.
- **Usage of Tobacco:** The term "use" is broadly defined to include all manners of consuming tobacco products, including but not limited to smoking, chewing, and any other forms of ingestion.
- **Alcohol:** This includes, but is not limited to, beer, wine, spirits (such as vodka, whiskey, gin, rum), liqueurs, and any other beverages containing ethyl alcohol or ethanol. It also covers homemade or unlicensed alcoholic concoctions. The consumption, possession, or distribution of alcoholic beverages on school property or during school-related events is strictly prohibited, regardless of the type or alcohol content.
- **Illegal Drugs:** As defined by federal, state, or local law, encompass a variety of substances. These include narcotics like heroin, morphine, fentanyl, and opium derivatives; stimulants such as cocaine, methamphetamine, and certain misused prescription medications; hallucinogens including LSD, peyote, psilocybin (magic mushrooms), and MDMA (ecstasy/molly); depressants like GHB, Rohypnol, and barbiturates; cannabis products such as marijuana, hashish, and synthetic cannabinoids, with consideration to local legal regulations; inhalants, including substances like glue, paint thinners, or nitrous oxide used for intoxication; and the misuse of prescription medications, including painkillers (e.g., oxycodone), ADHD medications (e.g., Adderall), and anti-anxiety medications (e.g., Xanax) without a prescription or not as prescribed by a doctor. This list, while comprehensive, is not exhaustive and may be subject to updates in accordance with legal changes.

## STATEMENT ON HUMAN SEXUALITY AND IDENTITY

Brentwood Adventist Christian School is a grades k-8 educational institution that is owned and operated by the Dakota Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, which is a part of the worldwide Seventh-day Adventist Church. As such, we adhere to the teachings of the Seventh-day Adventist

Church and its interpretation and understanding of the Scriptures. Therefore, we strive to conduct educational ministry within the world, maintaining our commitment to God as our Creator and Savior, and to fulfill the Gospel commission of sharing Jesus Christ and His love with the world.

With this foundation, we offer the following: first, as a Seventh-day Adventist educational institution, we neither condone nor promote any behavior outside of the Adventist Biblical beliefs. Brentwood Adventist Christian School's policy on human sexuality and identity is based on the North American Division Statement on Human Sexuality. This statement is based on Seventh-day Adventist understanding of Scripture. Second, our teachings on human sexuality and identity throughout our curriculum are aligned with Seventh-day Adventist Biblical beliefs.

As a part of our commitment to Seventh-day Adventist education, we have adopted the following guidelines to ensure that student behavior is consistent with Seventh-day Adventists beliefs:

- Students shall not engage in physical conduct between students that is sexual or overly affectionate in nature. Prohibited physical conduct includes consensual sexual activity between unmarried people as well as public displays of affection and other intimate contact. The basic policy for students is "hands off."
- Students shall not promote, advocate for, or engage in a lifestyle while enrolled in Brentwood Adventist Christian School that is inconsistent with Seventh Day Adventist doctrine and beliefs. This includes, but is not limited to, those sexual behaviors or lifestyles, such as promiscuity, homosexuality, and the viewing or sharing of pornography or sexual content (including via social media and electronic messaging), that exemplify or demonstrate relationships outside of acceptable Biblical practices. NAD Statements on Human Sexuality, pg. 3.
- Students must state their birth gender on the application for school. The birth gender must reflect the gender identified on the student's birth certificate, which will determine restroom/locker room use, sports team choices, uniform choices, pronouns, and any other issue concerning a student's sex as identified in the student handbook.
- Students must provide the name listed on the student's birth certificate, which will be used as the name in all official records of the Brentwood Adventist Christian School.

The purpose of this statement is to provide parents, students, and staff with clarity regarding the expectations of the Brentwood Adventist Christian School, and any violation of this policy may result in appropriate disciplinary action, including expulsion. However, clarity should not be confused with, nor be used to justify, conduct intended to injure, demean, or harass another person. Neither is clarity a substitute for compassion and civility. Brentwood Adventist Christian School is called to love all people. Our goal is to create an environment where all people love and respect each other.

## **NOTIFICATION OF ASBESTOS-CONTAINING MATERIALS**

Asbestos is a mineral fiber found in rock and is a health hazard risk only if the fibers are released and present in the air for people to breathe. Asbestos was used extensively in a variety of building materials from 1945 to 1978. Caution must be exercised in dealing with asbestos-containing materials in order to protect your health.

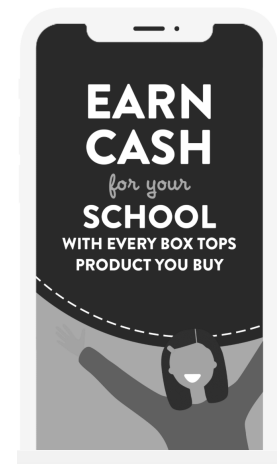
On October 22, 1986, President Reagan signed into law the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA, Public Law 99-519). The law required the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to develop regulations for asbestos hazard abatement in schools. On October 30, 1987, the EPA published the “Asbestos-Containing Materials in School” rule. The rule required all schools to inspect for asbestos and assess its condition, develop management plans that address asbestos hazards, and implement response actions in a timely fashion.

Brentwood Adventist Christian School complies with the requirements of the rule. An EPA accredited asbestos inspector was hired for the inspection and assessment. This inspection showed asbestos in the sprayed-on texture material on the ceilings and in the linoleum in the coatroom. The asbestos containing materials are in a non-friable condition, which presents NO hazard to anyone.
