The Dream of a Little Sanctuary

Mr. Alvin Yates, a life-long resident of Cross Plains, dreamed of a "Little Sanctuary" in the woods of Cross Plains. In his mind he could see families living in the area coming together each Sabbath Morning rather than driving to distant churches. He visualized the missionary work that could be done, and the gospel seeds that could be sown. He thought of a plan that would start making his dream come true.

He contacted the Ayres', the Day's, the Graves', the Tinnon's and the Yates', all living in Cross Plains, White House area. Their responses were very positive and favorable to his plan.

Mr. Yates' daughter Noble, a nurse at Madison Sanitarium, mentioned to her father that Dr. Ramsey who had recently completed his residency at the Sanitarium, wanted to move his growing family to a country environment. When Mr. Yates met with Dr. Ramsey, he found the doctor quite interested in setting up his practice in Cross Plains. Together they met with the Cross Plains "Council" and Dr. Ramsey was welcomed to fill the doctor's office that had been vacant for sometime.

It was a rainy day in May when Dr. and Mrs. Ramsey and their seven children, with the help of Clarence Yates and Charles Hardin, moved into their temporary home on Young's Road. A few days later, Viola Parkhurst, who was to be Dr. Ramsey's office nurse, arrived from Missouri with her two children. They found a comfortable home in Orlinda. Mr. and Mrs. Menzano, an elderly couple from Madison, friends of the Yates', asked to have a part in the new venture. Their help proved to be a real blessing.

Mr. Yates and Dr. Ramsey took their plans of starting a church to Elder Marley, President of the Kentucky-Tennessee Conference. He felt there was a good prospect for starting a Seventh-day Adventist Company in Cross Plains. He also suggested speakers that would be available to bring timely messages each Sabbath.

Now, Mr. Yates began looking for a suitable meeting place. He found the very old Community Building available rent-free if used for religious services. He immediately made arrangements for its use.

Elder Wayne Foster, of the Educational Department of the Conference, was consulted regarding a possibility of starting a church school. He heartily approved the idea and recommended Kitty Thrall, who had just completed the Teachers' Training course at Madison College as teacher. So, Don and Kitty Thrall moved to Cross Plains with 4 of their 5 children. (Their daughter, Donna was attending Highland Academy.)

The first Sabbath afternoon following Camp Meeting, the entire group met at the Community Building. There was an inspirational devotional and a story for the children. After a brief discussion, they voted to meet each week for Sabbath School and Church..


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The Dream of a Little Sanctuary, Continued

The Little Sanctuary Is Organized

Early in July, leaders of the close-knit group accosted Elder Marley regarding organization. The 21st of July, Elder Marley and Conference Secretary, Elder Dunn, came prepared to organize a Company. They found a very determined group expecting nothing less than Church organization. So Elder Marley and Elder Dunn returned the following week with the necessary material and information.

It was July 28, 1958 (Beulah Graves' birthday) that the first Seventh-day Adventist church was organized in Cross Plains with 19 charter members. It was the 72nd church in the Kentucky-Tennessee Conference. The new church became a part of the Boulevard-Ridgetop district with Elder Douglas Bennett as Pastor.

That evening a nominating committee was chosen and officers for the remainder of the year were elected. The officers were:

Usually it would be very difficult to plan a Sabbath School program for 30-35 children, ages 18 months to 13 years. But these children were exceptionally reverent and attentive. They enjoyed the songs, stories, the Sabbath School lessons and any exercises. The teachers had well-planned lessons. Each teacher gathered her class close to her. They listened quietly, and were soon taking an active part.

The Little Sanctuary is Organized, Continued

Mr. Yates was especially interested in the children. There were 22 children of the charter members, and each week he invited community children to join them. We seldom counted less than 30-35 children. Mr. Yates called them his "Little Flower Garden". Every Sabbath morning he would "peek" into the kitchen, explaining, "I just wanted to see how my Little Flower Garden is doing". One memorable morning there were 50 little blossoms to greet him!

School began in September. The school room was Viola Parkhurst's front room. Mr. Thrall made temporary, moveable blackboards. With Mrs. Ramsey's desk for the teacher, a small book case with special books for extra reading, borrowed school desks and brand new text and work books, Mrs. Thrall and her 6 pupils started the first church school in Cross Plains.

With organization comes the responsibility of taking a more active roll in the Seventh-day Adventist mission: "The Gospel to all the world".

Cross Plains, Tennessee, now has a Seventh-day Adventist church, newly organized with approximately 20 members on Monday night, July 28. Officiating at the organization was the conference president, Elder E. L. Marley, and also present were R. W. Dunn, conference secretary-treasurer, and Elder H. D. Bennett, who will include Cross Plains in his Madison Boulevard-Ridgetop district.

FLOWER GARDEN

Brother and Sister Alvin Yates have lived many years in this area and have been most active in sharing their faith with friends and neighbors. Dr. and Mrs. Wayne O. Ramsey recently moved from Madison College into Cross Plains. Along with others who have come in and accepted the message, they have a fine group to form the nucleus of a strong church to carry on God's work in that area. Cross Plains adds one more torch to the group of churches which are letting their lights shine throughout the Kentucky-Tennessee Conference.

The Little Sanctuary is Taking Shape

The week following organization, Elder Bennett met with us for our first mid-week Prayer Meeting. He especially reminded us to let our light shine and left us this challenging quotation: "There is no limit to what the Lord can do with a life consecrated to Him."

That night a Building Committee was selected: James Ayres, Don Thrall and O. W. Ramsey. Mr. Yates, in conference with several others, made final arrangements to purchase the property he called "an answer" to his dream. He also had the land bulldozed in preparation for the builders. With deed in hand, the Committee met to make definite plans.


Cash and pledges began coming to the Treasurer. Her first report showed gifts ranging from \$500 to .10. One dime! Now who would have contributed that? The record showed it was 5 year-old Tommy Day who wanted to do his part.

Tommy's little gift inspired other children. Each week Beulah found small offerings, usually less than a dollar, with a childish-written name on the envelope. She faithfully recorded each one, and God blessed the gifts and the givers.

The Community Building was certainly a comfortable and convenient place of worship for our small group. But we looked forward to having our own "Little Sanctuary".

The Building Community lost no time in getting started. Plans were drawn up and stakes driven. Elder Marley was invited to inspect the plans and offer any suggestions. He came with Elder Mohr of the M.V. Department. Their response reminded us of Isaiah 54:2, "Enlarge the place of thy tent, lengthen the cords, and strengthen the stakes." What they actually said was "Lengthen the building by 10 feet; widen the school room by 4 feet; and plan on a 10-foot ceiling." These adjustments were gladly made and work began immediately. After church each week, nearly everyone drove to the new church site to see what progress had been made during the week.

At first, much work was done by members that meant considerable savings. Also, Mr. Yates was given the bricks for a third of the usual price. Clarence was given over a hundred dollars worth of lumber suitable for sub-flooring. By the end of December, excavating was complete; foundations built; sub-flooring laid; walls up; roof on; and well drilled. The building was taking shape; but work was suspended for the cold winter months.

The year 1959 arrived with promise of good things to come.

- Alaska and Hawaii were admitted to the Union as the 49th and 50th states
- The Kentucky-Tennessee Conference office was moved from 2308 West End in Nashville, to Gallatin Road in Madison

School resumed in the Ramsey living room with 3 new students. Surrounding the home were beautiful green fields, a variety of trees and a wide, bubbling stream. It was an ideal place for nature walks and general recreation.

The Conference had purchased property near Liberty, Tennessee for a Youth Camp with Elder Bill Dopp as Youth Leader in charge. He sent word to all the church school children to give their suggestions for a name. The winning entry, "Indian Creek Camp" was sent in by Joy Ramsey (her own idea with no help from anyone). She was awarded the first week at camp that summer free.

Work had resumed early in February. With the Lord's help, rapid strides were made.

- The Electric Department from Madison College, under the direction of Mr. Weddel, donated several days' labor to do the wiring and install the light fixtures. Soon the gas heater was in place and working well and the plumbing was complete.
- Landscaping added beauty. Viola Parkhurst and Beulah Graves contributed several flowering bushes and trees. Tiny blades of greens were peeping up promising a lovely lawn.
- Mr. Burgess Thomas, of the Thomas Drug Store, donated the interior paint.
- Mr. and Mrs. Salsgiver of Ridgetop made and donated a registry board to be hung on the front wall.
- Pastor and Mrs. Miles Coon, also of Ridgetop, gave the clock to hang on the back wall.
- Mr. and Mrs. Manzanoa gave their family piano to the school.
- Mr. and Mrs. White McClanahan of Springfield presented the church with a beautiful Werlitzer piano in honor of his mother who had lived in Cross Plains as a girl, and distributed Adventist literature to her friends and neighbors.

• Ella McClanahan, now in her 80's, was a member of Ridgetop church, but transferred to Cross Plains. It was an honor to have her as a member.

On March 29, just eight months and one day after organization, the first Prayer and Praise service was held in our own "Little Sanctuary".

Borrowed chairs and pulpit from the Community Building were set up on the sturdy subflooring. Mildred Ayres, with lots of help, brought her piano. That night, with Mildred playing her piano and Dr. Ramsey leading, we sang "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow" as requested by Mr. Yates, and he offered the first prayer in the "Little Sanctuary". The joy of that meeting was an unforgettable experience.

Although there was still much work to be done, it was a beautiful building to those who had worked, waited, prayed, and sacrificed as the Little Sanctuary grew. Seven members transferred from other churches. After a short evangelistic series, Elder Bennett baptized eight new members. Membership was now 34.

On April 14, 1959, curious eyes peeping out of their windows could have seen a red and grey station wagon moving slowly down Young's Road, turning at Hwy 25, then onto Payne Bridge Road (as Jernigan Road was then known) and pulling up at the new church. Larry, Joy, Joanne and Jackie, with arms extended out of open windows balanced the blackboard on top.

After several more trips from the temporary school room, and with much arranging and rearranging, Mrs. Thrall and her nine students were ready for the next Monday morning in their own school room.

It was as Elder Bennett said, "The Lord is rewarding your faith and work."



The Little Sanctuary is Dedicated for a Mission

In September 1959, a new school year began. Mrs. Thrall now had ten pupils in her school room.

Elder Bennett's district was divided and we became a part of the Highland district, with Elder Edwin Beck as Pastor. He and his wife and three children had just returned from spending five years in Burma. They shared many stories, colorful pictures and artifacts from that country made so well-known by Eric B Hare (Dr. Rabbit) and his special stories.

The Little Sanctuary was now nearing completion. The floor was sanded and varnished. The carpet was purchased from Henry Bell Furniture Co. in Springfield, and Mr. Cook, the proprietor donated his time and work to install it.

During the first week of November, furniture was ordered from a Texas factory. Mr. Burgess had asked to pay for the pulpit. Several pews were paid for by friends or relatives of members. Borrowed furniture was returned to the Community Building. One more time we met there for Sabbath School and Church as we waited for our furniture. The new light oak furniture arrived on Monday. As could have been expected, everyone at some time during the two days it took to install it, was on hand, just to see the last phase of furnishing our Little Sanctuary.

With the furniture came two small stands to be placed on each side of the pulpit. McFarland's Greenhouse donated three lovely plants and planters to be placed on the communion table and on each of the small stands.

Our Little Sanctuary was complete, debt free, lacking one week of being 16 months since organization. During that time not one call for needed funds was made on any Sabbath. When a bill came due, money was in the bank. Surely the sacrificial planning and giving was pleasing the Lord.

On November 2, 1959, Elder Beck led a beautiful dedication service. Elder Marley was the guest speaker. Many friends from the community and from Adventist churches in Madison and Ridgetop met with us on this special day. Each Sabbath morning for the next seven years, we met for church and Sabbath School and on Wednesday evening for mid-week prayer meeting.

For each Sabbath afternoon, Jimmy Day planned interesting Missionary Volunteer programs in which he involved all the youth. Ingathering goals were reached each year by December 31. At Halloween the children gathered canned food and non-perishable items for Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets. A singing band visited the nursing home almost every week.

Evangelistic services were held. Elder Beck and his family gave a good travelogue of Burma before each well-planned service. Elder Hooper came to help Elder Ron Watson, our Pastor, hold a tent meeting in Orlinda. (Elder Watson told us later it was his first experience pitching a






Cross Plains Sabbath School Room Gets a New Look

A Blessed Tragedy Comes to the Little Sanctuary

The members saw the need for more room for their activities. They planned an Educational Building (later known as their Community Building). There would be school rooms and a community services room, built over a useful gym. Mr. Jack Williams was overseer of this project which began in 1965 and was nearing completion by the beginning of 1966.

All seemed to be going very well. Then, suddenly before 6 o'clock Sunday morning, February 13, 1966, a neighbor, Janell Jernigan who was on her way to work, yelled in at the front door, "Dr. Ramsey, your church is on fire".

He dressed more speedily than usual, grabbed a hose and dashed to the flaming church. He hoped to prevent flames from reaching the Educational Building. To his dismay, he saw the wind was blowing flames directly toward it.

The fire department responded immediately. Our new pastor, Elder Doyle Philips along with other members who had been notified, stood watching helplessly. All at once the wind changed direction and flames blew away from the Educational Building!

With all their efforts, the firemen could not quench the flames. The church was completely destroyed. In the previous week, the gas company had been notified of trouble with the heater. They had promised to be out on Monday morning to check it, but that was too late.

Sad as it was, we could see God's protective hand at work; first, in Janell's frantic call and secondly, in the change in the direction of the wind. If the heater had "blown up" on Sabbath, the church and Sabbath School was in full attendance. If it had happened on Monday, the school would have been in session; the teacher's desk was directly above the heater. On Sunday, no one was present, and no injuries resulted.

Before the flames had died down, many friends from the community came by. Several quietly slipped checks, cash or pledges into Dr. Ramsey's pocket. Everyone knew him. Our new pastor, Doyle Philips had not had time to get acquainted with our friends. Almost \$1,000 was given that day.

Brother Little, Pastor of the nearby Methodist church, along with a sizable check, offered the use of their church as long as we needed it. The offer was gladly accepted. For the next $10 \frac{1}{2}$ months it was our comfortable church home.

Kathleen Bryant was Sabbath School superintendent. In February, she announced that Visitors' Day would be the first Sabbath in April. But the last Sabbath in February, she announced that Visitors' Day would be next week. She reminded us to invite others. When asked why she changed the date, she answered, "Oh, I don't know. I just thought it would be a good idea."


THE BUILDING that was saved had recently been completed and classroom work was to have begun this week.





The Silver Lining in the Clouds that Destroyed the Little Sanctuary

Lottie Tinnon was chosen Chairperson for the rebuilding of the Little Sanctuary. This time, it would be larger and have its own baptistery. A new idea: there would be red carpeting over the entire floor and four feet up the wall. This elicited many comments from visitors who had not seen this arrangement before. There would be dark paneling and dark furniture. On the lower level, would be a kitchen, a fellowship room and a number of class rooms for children's Sabbath School.

There were many helpers, some donating much of their time. Bobby Collins laid the brick; Floyd Carter was official painter. James Ramsey (Dr. Ramsey's twin brother) took his summer vacation away from teaching in his 5th grade classroom to assist with the carpenter work. Buster Mundy was there to help wherever needed. Mr. Burgess Thomas again funded the interior paint, and asked to pay for the pulpit. Juanita Payne, from Highland, painted the beautiful scene above the baptistery (under the watchful eyes of a fascinated audience of course.) Mrs. Randolph arranged for the lovely maroon curtains that could be pulled as desired to protect the baptistery.

Near the close of 1966, 10 ½ months after the fire, the new Little Sanctuary was nearly complete with the furniture all in place except for a piano. Dr. and Mrs. Ramsey loaned their new Hammand piano and organ for the first service. They fit so well with the décor that they did not remove them. The piano was given to the church in memory of Joy who had often played for church service and children's programs and an evangelistic service before she had become a victim of a fatal automobile accident. The organ was given in honor of Joanne who played the organ for the first service and others as needed. She often played the piano for services as well.

The baptistery was in frequent use. We also welcomed a number of members transferring from other churches. Each one added to the up building of the church. There were also happy weddings and a few sad funerals.

In the spacious fellowship room, besides the friendship meals on many Sabbaths, there were Saturday night socials, wedding receptions, birthday and anniversary celebrations as well as cooking and health classes. The children and their leaders and teachers enjoyed the bright new rooms for each division.

At first the janitor and yard work was maintained by members. Frequent work bees kept the fresh clean appearance of the church.

The Educational Building with the gym was a great asset. The gym was used not only for recreational purposes, but also served as a large community dining room for the special community meals Mrs. Randolph sponsored on a number of Sundays. Neighborhood churches were invited to come after their services for a vegetarian meal. We received many complements for our "fine food" (and gladly accepted their donations for our welfare work). Other meals were

served on Randolph's front lawn or in a tent borrowed from Barber's Funeral Home and pitched on the front lawn of the church.

On June 20, 1972 with the church debt free, our Pastor Elder Clarence Southard officiated at the beautiful dedication service for this rebuilt "Little Sanctuary". Elder Harold Schmidt, President of the Southern Union was the guest speaker. Elder Kimber Johnson, President of the Kentucky-Tennessee Conference was also present. Our membership had more than tripled since our organization in 1958.

The church continued to meet regularly for the usual services. There were also graduations, Vacation Bible Schools, and frequent programs given by the children depicting denominational history, or a Christmas or Easter themes using *The Deisre of Ages*, and suitable songs for the theme.

The summer after the dedication, 20 members became the nucleus for a new church in White House. They were sadly missed in Cross Plains, but we rejoiced with them as the church grew and prospered.

Fire threatened again – twice. About dedication time it was found that it was an arson who had set fire in the children's Sabbath School storage room, destroying over \$1,000 worth of pictures, books and furniture.

On April 20, 1994, caused by a damaged wire, (believed to be due to gnawing by a mouse), a fire was started in the attic. It was detected early by a neighbor and the fire department was able to control the blaze so that no furniture was lost. There was, however, considerable smoke and water damage to the interior of the building.

With the wise counsel and leadership of our 20th Pastor, Elder Steve Rose, the building was now brought up to the new fire code. A ramp was built at the front porch and special fire exits were made available. The dark paneling was replaced with clean white paint. The floor was carpeted in blue. Cushions were placed on each pew. The recessed lights were replaced by beautiful hanging lamps.

Elder Rose helped us see the changes in décor were part of the silver lining in the smoky clouds after the fire. But there were other changes. Elder and Mrs. Rose were transferred to the Gulf States Conference. They had been with us six years. We had already seen our first 19 Pastors transferred. Elder Rose reminded us that when there is growth there will be changes and each new pastor will have a part in that growth. We missed them, but we accepted the changes as part of the silver lining.

Church School Days at the Little Sanctuary

The first church school had opened in September 1958, two months after the church was organized with Kitty Thrall as the first teacher. It must have been a record: 3 school rooms that first year! The first semester school was held in Parkhurst's front room. Second semester began in Ramsey's front room; but ended in the school room at the Little Sanctuary. School would held there until the last half of the 8th year of school. During these years, there would also be 5 different teachers.

Almost every spring, Elder Foster sponsored a Music Festival for the church school children of the Conference. Copies of songs to be used were sent to the teachers and they took time to teach the children each song.

Two days before the Festival, the teachers and children gathered at Highland Academy for final practice and instruction. Besides songs by the entire chorus, there were instrumental numbers and special songs by smaller groups.

In defense of the time spent in teaching children music, Elder Foster made this unforgettable statement (among others): "Teach a boy to blow a trumpet, and he won't blow up a bank."

The programs were well attended, very successful, and a highlight of the school year.

Following Kitty Thrall, the teachers were Fern Ramsey, Linda Williams, Evelyn Simmons and Ruth Bolton.

Church School Days at the Little Sanctuary, Continued

At the time of the fire Evelyn Simmons was teaching. The 1965-66 school year began as usual. After the fire, teacher and students bravely finished the year in the unfinished gym.

It was almost unbelievable to see how much necessary equipment filled the empty place. The Cross Plains public school donated the desks they had just replaced with new ones. Ridgetop church school and Highland Elementary loaned as many books as they had available. Mr. Eckles of the Eckles School Supply in Springfield gave a large set of world maps. Church members helped supply paper, pencils, workbooks and other necessities. There were sufficient supplies so that the school could continue in spite of many inconveniences.

Graduation for the three students was also held in the gym. After the usual exercises, speaker, and presentation of diplomas, there was an informal reception. All the schoolmates, parents, and many friends were present that evening.

The 1967 school year was to begin in the hastily prepared but still inadequate school rooms in the unfinished Educational Building with Miss Ruth Bolton as the teacher. However, it was soon apparent that this was not a good arrangement. Because of the added expense in building, it was thought best to close the school for the present. Miss Bolton was transferred, and the school children were given opportunity to attend Highland Elementary school.

Transportation for the 17 miles between Cross Plains and Highland loomed up as a problem. The difficulty was solved when Mrs. Ramsey offered to take the children to and from school each day. The morning drive to school was used for greetings, exchanging news and sharing plans for the day. But the way home seemed long to the tired, hungry students and tempers often flared. Finally Mrs. Ramsey planned her strategies.

- Strategy #1 On a seldom used road, every one out of the car . . . By briskly walking or slowly jogging before the creeping car, by the end of a couple of blocks or so, they were calmed and in a better mood.
- Strategy #2 Apples, popcorn, unshelled peanuts, or similar treats kept them busy and quelled the appetites until they were home.
- Strategy #3 For good behavior, boys were allowed to ride on the hood, girls on the trunk for the last quarter of a mile on the un-traveled road to the first drop off while the car again crept along.

The relief of frustration, the jolly goodbyes and the promise of "I'll see you in the morning" were reward for the extra time and planning. Mrs. Ramsey used her judgment as to which strategy would work best on any day. Their routine continued for four years until the last Cross Plains student graduated. The students and numbers involved varied each year. Elder Glass, Bible teacher at the academy once remarked, "Mrs. Ramsey, you could turn your car loose and after all these trips it would know the way home." Except for "turning the car loose", he was right. It still needed an alert driver who followed the way.

Church School Days at the Little Sanctuary, Continued

The saddest result of the fire was closing the church school. The silver Lining . . .? At the larger school there were more rooms, more teachers, more library space, more recreational equipment, and more possibility of widening the circle of friends. Both Highland Elementary and Ridgetop church schools were within driving distance and in either one, students deciding to attend would be welcomed.

1958

August – We came together for the first time as a church following organization on July 28. There were 71 members and guests present.

September – The children's memory verse was "Great is Thy faithfulness". To illustrate faith, Mrs. Ramsey stood little Ellen on the table and held out her arms. Ellen jumped – showing faith in her mother, just as we are to show faith in God.

November – This was 6 week-old Randy Hardin's first visit to the Sabbath School. His sisters, Brenda and Diana took turns holding him as the children sang, "There is a New Baby at Harden's House".

1959

January – It was Bank Day in the children's room. A Branch Bank of Heaven was opened, with Charlotte Parkhurst as Vice-President, Larry Thrall and Joy Ramsey as cashiers. Each child wishing to open an account in his or her own name was given a penny as a starter. There was 100% response. Beside the regular Mission offering each child was encouraged to bring something to put into the Bank of Heaven toward the 13th Sabbath offering.

March – Our newest member, Randy Hardin opened his account in the Bank of Heaven. Today the total assets stand at over \$18.

April – Dr. Ramsey led out in the very first Sabbath School in our own little sanctuary. For special music, Dr. Ramsey and his visiting nephew, Kenneth Ramsey, played a trumpet duet. They were accompanied by Viola Parkhurst at the piano.

April – A special exercise was planned for Mr. Yates' birthday. His grandson Eddie Russell, whose birthday is also in April, was chosen to present Mr. Yates with a small bouquet from the children in honor of his interest in his "Little Flower Garden".

May – Freddie Parkhurst brought two little birds he had found fallen from their nest. The children sang, "God Sees the Little Sparrow Fall". They decided one way God cares for them is to have someone special find them when they fall.

September 12 – Elder Beck, our new Pastor and his wife, met with us for the first time. He told several stories about Burma. Their three children, Nancy, Jeannie and Peter, sang "Jesus Loves Me" in Burmese.

November – In Sabbath School the children were studying about Daniel. Mrs. Ramsey gave the older children a note paper and asked them to write something they had done to be brave like Daniel. Jimmy Ayres wrote, "When the cow kicked and spilt the milk, I didn't get mad". That seems to be the way Jimmy meets unexpected circumstances.

1960

November – The children enjoyed acting out their Sabbath School lesson about the Good Samaritan. A rug road led from Jerusalem to Jericho. Overturned chairs were rocks. Phyllis Ramsey represented the man robbed and left to die. Joy Ramsey and Jimmy Ayres were the priest and Levite who completely ignored him. Joanne Ramsey was the Good Samaritan who came by on her donkey (Douglas Ramsey) and took the victim to the inn where David Ayres was the inn keeper.

1963

January – The girls' chorus sang "Every Year with Jesus" for the birthday exercise. The chorus included Ginger Ayres, Carol Day, Brenda Hardin and Joy and Joanne Ramsey.

February – Investment dime banks were distributed. Last year Beulah Graves saved more than \$20 in dimes for investment.

March – Brenda Hardin sang "Teach Me to Pray Lord" for special music.

April – A poll was taken for the favorite hymn of Sabbath School members. "The Old Rugged Cross" was the special choice. It was chosen by Anne Davis, Diana Hardin, Phyllis Ramsey, Glenda Tinnon, Lottie Tinnon and Carol Day.

April marks the birthdays of our oldest and youngest Sabbath School members. Mr. Yates was 73, "Little" Walter Tinnon was 3. Two candles were placed on the table. One was quite short, but the flame was still burning brightly. The other was tall and also burning brightly.

At first the children thought the tall candle represented Mr. Yates and the short one "Little" Walter. But one Junior explained that Mr. Yates candle had been burning 73 years so the shorter candle represented him. "Little" Walter's candle had only been burning 3 years so his candle was taller.

Mr. Yates and Little Walter were each given a small birthday plant.

December – This was the last Sabbath of the year, but it was the best in several ways. In spite of the weather, attendance was excellent. The 13th Sabbath offering was twice as large as any previously taken.

1964

April – Ginger Bryant and Joanne Ramsey sang "Each Step I Take" for Ruth Jernigan and Alvin Yates, our two oldest Sabbath School members.

May – Mrs. Ramsey planned a special program to honor our mothers and grandmothers. The program was introduced by the children as they sang "With Mother in the Family".

Bobby Ayres gave a special welcome to the mothers. Jimmy Ayres and his mother Mildred sang "My Mother's Prayers Have Followed Me".

Ginger Ayers gave the poem "The Three Mothers". On the platform was Della Yates in her rocking chair representing the Mothers of Yesterday; her daughter, Norma Dean Hardin was sitting nearby representing the Mothers of Today; sitting in a small chair by her mother was Diana Hardin holding her dolly, representing the Mothers of Tomorrow.

All mothers and grandmothers were given a special Mothers' Day flower.

June – Kathleen Bryant put a quiz on the blackboard. The children enjoyed filling in the missing words.

July – Jany and Jeffrey Bryant took the 13th Sabbath offering dressed as American Indians.

August – The members were all thankful Morse and Kathleen Bryant, and Dr. Ramsey were spared with only minor injuries in the two recent automobile accidents. Also, they were so happy to know that Mable West was not injured when she fell down the cement steps in her basement.

October – On this 13th Sabbath we were greeted by 2 smiling Coolies, Gary Bryant and Gary Stewart. Diana Hardin dressed in an oriental costumes sat by a tiny tea table with a colorful parasol in the background. Just before the offering was taken, Pamela Jernigan and Roger Brewer illustrated the poem, "Mission Babies".

1965

November – The youth class quietly sang "Tread Softly" as they make their way to the platform where they conducted the entire Sabbath School program.

Jimmy Ayres was Sabbath School superintendent, Carol Day secretary; Johnny Day offered the opening prayer; James Day gave the Mission story. After the Sabbath School class the youth sang "What a Wonderful Savior is Jesus my Lord". Each stanza was introduced by a quotation from *Steps to Christ*, read by Joe Dale Ayres and Brenda Hardin.

June – The mission exercise was given by 4 juniors, Gary Bryant, Douglas Ramsey, Diana Hardin and Glenda Tinnon.

July – During the 13th Sabbath program, a visiting nurse from North Africa told several interesting stories.

August – Brenda and Diana Hardin repeated the Ten Commandments. Six of the 19 primary and junior children have completed that memory work.

September – In the mission exercise, the story of the "Unhappy Brides" was given as a dialogue by Jany Bryant, Glenda Tinnon, Phyllis and Ellen Ramsey, Peggy and Linda Carter.

The juniors had charge of Sabbath School. They chose "heaven" as their theme. The opening song was "Just Over the Mountain in the Promised Land".

Douglas Ramsey acted as superintendent and Glenda Tinnon as secretary. Glenda, Diana and Phyllis gave the mission story. Gary Bryant gave an interesting story showing the differences between animals now and those we will see in heaven. Gary Stewart gave a poem, "How Beautiful Heaven Must Be" as the girls illustrated it on the flannel board.

November – Visitors were welcomed by a poem given by Billy Jernigan and illustrated with pictures by Jim Carter's class.

Mrs. Charles Howard whom Eugene Graves invited, and Tammy Jernigan, great granddaughter of Ruth Jernigan, were the youngest and oldest guest, and were each given a small booklet as a remembrance.

The Cross Plains Sabbath School followed many others in omitting the secretary report SO NO MORE VIGNETTES!







Witnessing on the Road trucker's story

Paul Reynolds is a member of the Cross Plains Church who spends his week behind the steering wheel of an eighteen-wheeler. I asked him to share with us a story of witnessing on the road. Editor.



I have been ask many times if when I'm out on the road I'm able to witness to oth-

"You don't have an appointment number. Call your company and get one," said the clerk.

Several other drivers got the same response. The line gradually moved from the clerk's window to the phones as the drivers got the bad news. Their speech was liberally sprinkled with four-letter words, and the clerk was spoken of very badly.

As my turn came to approach the clerk it was apparent he was frustrated. "What is your number and appointment time?" he demanded.

"Here, my friend, are my bills. All numbers are in the corner top," I answered.

"What? You are a Christian?" he said, stunning me.

I heard his response very well because there wasn't a sound in the room. Every driver was looking right at me. Each one in the room could hear my response.

"Yes, I walk and talk to the Master every day."

I have wondered many times what I said (or maybe didn't say) that caught this person's attention.

The story is told in Matthew 26:73 of how Peter betrayed Christ at the time of Jesus arrest by the crudeness of his speech. I believe even our speech will testify of our allegiance. Hopefully it will reflect Jesus, because the only sermon some people will ever hear will be a the one we live.

Witnessing in the Workplace can they co-exist?

When we get up every morning, ready for our work day, I sincerely hope we spend a few precious moments with Jesus first. If we claim to be servants for Christ and want to share truth with others, then we must prepare our hearts, spiritually, for the work day ahead. Also a good, positive, cheerful attitude attracts others to want to listen to you.

I work in a non-Adventist institution, actually a hospital. I work in a delicate area, treating patients that just have gone through a major life threatening "heart event". It is a cardiac rehab area. People need positive encouraging words at this point in their lives. Working in a hospital setting, I can not "initiate" a discussion of my beliefs. However, if a patient brings up a comment about God or religion, then I have the opportunity to comment back. have found that if you ask Jesus to open doors, He will. Many times patients have suddenly asked me, out of the blue, what I think about a religious topic. I always say a silent quick prayer, asking for the Holy Spirit to guide my every word. Sometimes patient's give me the credit for their improvement in health and that is one of my favorite times to tell them "give all the credit to God". Here are a few of my experiences witnessing in the workplace.

One day I was talking to three patients and we were having a discussion about the goodness of Jesus Christ and how He makes a difference in our lives. A non-denominational preacher came up to me and told me I wasn't suppose to be discussing religion here. We had not been discussing doctrines but had been uplifting Jesus. I told this man, very calmly, "The day I cannot talk about Jesus is the day I don't need this job." When I looked back at the three patients sitting close by, one elderly black man nodded his head of approval to me. The non-denominational preacher left the area.

Another day a few years back, one I will never forget, I had the opportunity to talk with a elderly German patient, that claimed to be an atheist. He

began discussing the "big bang theory" with me. He was a very intelligent man, an engineer and professor. He wanted to know why I couldn't believe it. As we discussed our beliefs (God opens doors) I was able to witness about our "Creator". As we talked over the next few weeks about this topic, he opened up to me. He had lived in Germany as a young boy during WWII. He had seen and lived through many horrible things. His conclusion: "There couldn't be a God to allow so many horrific things to happen". It saddened my heart so much, and I earnestly prayed for him. I couldn't change his past. He one day told me his daughter was going to have a baby and that it would probably be a C-section and that he would be leaving to visit her soon. I was impressed by the Holy Spirit to tell him I would pray to God that she would be able to have a normal delivery without C-section. He just laughed. When he returned, he came up to me and told me his daughter delivered a healthy baby and didn't have to have a C-section. I reminded him that I had prayed to God for this. He nodded his head yes and smiled. Shortly after that, I went on leave to have my second child, Olivia. Upon my return to work about 4 months later, I heard that this patient had died. I don't know if he had a change of heart, but I hope that he found God.

Even if it is just to agree with a co-worker or a client that Jesus is good and is our Saviour, you are witnessing for Him. I have had many opportunities, and not every witnessing experience positive. Out of the blue, a patient asked me if I believed a person goes to heaven when they die. A co-worker quickly chimed in "She's a Seventh Day Adventist." I responded with truth, and that person looked appalled at me.

Never back down from truth. Keep an open mind to listen to others, then share Jesus and scripture truth when chances are made available.

> God has richly blest our work here in Malawi during the last several months. For a long time now we have been atrying to get land in the New Capital City on which to establish our work. It looked as if we were going to have to settle for some little isolated place in the old township. Thanks to the intervention of the Lord we have been able to get 25 acres in a beautiful location near to the new American Embassy building and about a block away from the new parliament building site. We are very busy right now raising funds for a new church and an evangelistic centre. We also want to build a medical-dental service on the 25 acres and eventually move our Union office to that site.


On the very day when we received information that we would be able to. secure this place His Excellency Dr. Banda gave a gift of a quarter of a million dollars to our medical-dental work here in the country from his own personal account. This was a tremendous gift to our mission and was very much needed.

We went to thank His Excellency on January 29 and spent 55 minutes with him. It was at that time that we learned that he had accepted an invitation to worship with us at Malamulo on March 3. When he came to the mission there were about 15,000 to 18,000 people present. It was a tremendous event with live radio coverage. The service went off very well and we have received many favourable compliments. I wish I could tell you all of the details about these events. On July 22 Barbara and I were invited to the State House for a reception in the honour of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth. We had the good fortune of being able to talk with the Queen. We were also invited to the State Banquet which followed the reception. This will go down in our lives as an outstanding moment.

Our work is going forward with great speed. Many people are taking their stand for the truth for which we are grateful.





Blessings and Benisons as you celebrate Fifty Years! That Julys!

You all were my very first parish entirely:

group at that time in 1963)

the city of the city o the city of Nashville...to the country! Since I had grown up in 'the city' (Jacksonville, FL), coming to Cross Plains was a very new experience for me.

However, the move was an exciting one for me since everyone in the congregation and in the community made me feel very welcome. I was grateful for all the membership's kindness and friendship as I came to live among you. The Ramseys helped to introduce me around the church folk and with the townspeople. I remember making arrangements with the Postmistress, Beulah Villines, in the postal office which was her house, as I recall. She was always very cordial and helpful to me. Also, I met the owner of the Chevrolet dealership...and asked him if I could rent his house out on the Highway 29 that he had built for his son (who was away during the Viet Nam war). When he came home, his girlfriend did not marry him; he did not care to use the pleasant cottage that his father had built for him adjacent to his brother's large farm. I was very pleased to have the opportunity to 'live in the country' and to have such a very delightful home where I could live close by the membership and to have a place to invite folk over.

I moved out there and church friends shared furniture with me (I was not married and did not have very much for domestic living!). I planted flowers, learned to mow the lawn, and enjoyed having farm animals 'out back'. And, someone gave me a rooster whom I named 'Chanticleer'; he woke me up every morning...until he disappeared. I fear he moved away to a neighbor's chicken yard where he could have more 'fellowship'! I named the house and land 'Wildacre' after a home in Colorado that belonged to my grandmother's father in Littleton. It was my first home, and I have always treasured its memory and the gracious days I enjoyed there.

Some church family gave me a little plot of land where I could plant potatoes. They helped me...well, actually they did the plowing...and then, showed me how to put the potato pieces with the 'eyes' in the mounds. Soon I had plants showing. One early Sunday morning I went over to weed and hoe. Someone drove by and shouted ... for me to 'get out of the garden on the Lord's Day!'. That was the last time I worked on a Sunday, realizing that some in the neighborhood could be offended.

The Methodist minister in Cross Plains was very friendly and cordial with me; he told me that he was the true 'Sabbath-keeper' since he rested on Saturday before the Sunday services...and that I really was 'working the hardest on the Sabbath', which was true! He liked to share with me and use a little humor in our relationship. He had been a missionary in South Korea and had known the Adventists there...and he bought his vegetables from the Adventist college outside Seoul from their school farm.

I once asked directions from an old man, when I was out visiting from home to home. He looked at me...and suggested, 'Wahl, young man, you jest drive on up this here road...'til you shoot tha Kentucky line; the thing tah do...is tah turn 'round, head back 82 R. watson

up tha way you'd come...and turn ri-upt at tha very next dirt lane!'. I loved his accent and colorful directions...and I found the place.

I very much enjoyed the church school we had at that time, and I would come over for stories and prayer in the mornings...and occasionally would stay around for a recess period. The Vacation Bible School was a busy and enjoyable time too as kids came 'from all around'. Ms Ramsey, her daughter, and the church women were very talented to work such a fine program for the community children.

We had meetings set to open in Orlinda...from the Conference Office suggestion, and the evangelist was Rainey Hooper. He called and suggested that I 'use a truck' and come over to Highland Academy and pick up the tent. Well, I was frightened with this prospect of driving a Conf. truck (which I had never done). I was very careful to keep it running (engine was a bit decrepit and I had a hard time starting it) and also to drive it in such a way and park it, so I would not have to put it in 'reverse' which I did not know how to accomplish! But we loaded up the tent and all its parts...and I carefully drove back to Cross Plains. I had a mimeographed page or two of instructions on 'how to erect at two pole tent', but I had not the least notion of how to begin this project or how to fully put this plan into operation. But...a lady in the church (her name escapes me), came over and took a look at my 'printed instructions'. She put her hands on her hips and told me 'not to worry'...she would 'pull this off' with the help of the church deacons, men, and elders. We made a time for everyone to come...and she directed the men (and men!), and soon that tent was up and standing ready for chairs, sawdust, and all the preparations for the coming 'prophetic meetings'. It was my first experience.

Unfortunately, I had a bad attack of appendicitis, and shortly I was taken by Dr Ramsey to Madison Hospital for surgery. He performed the operation for me and looked after my medical needs, at no expense to me (his kindness knew no bounds, in finances or friendship!). As a result, I was not 'up and out' and able to attend the services in Orlinda.

Shortly thereafter, the Conference Committee and leadership decided to have Elder Hooper take over my parish work, and I was moved to Dickson, TN. I did ask if the Conference brethren would reconsider and allow me to 'stay on' (and I was to be married in the late autumn, and it was now late summer), but they had made their plans and needed me to follow along with their counsels. So, I was to move away...

I was broken-hearted, but I did as I was told and prepared to leave my 'country house' and all my good friends and neighbors around Cross Plains.

Postscript:

I recall that at the campmeeting time I asked the Conference for permission to remain in my home at Wildacre for the two weeks of services, etc. But they said they wanted me to be 'on campus' there at Fountainhead/Highland Academy. However, oddly, they said I could not rent a dormitory room nor could I be permitted to use a small tent or any of the Conference accommodations! I asked them 'why?'...and they said that since I was not married they could not take the risk of having me 'footloose' sleeping just anywhere during the campmeeting sessions! Mercy! I felt like asking the Cross Plains congregation to give me 'recommendations' and 'references' since they were having to put up with my reputation and youthful activities in the community! But, the dentist family, the Trivetts, gave me a room while I was busy with all the 'camp pitch' and the work I did in the junior department tent (not much time with all this activity for young ministerial foolishness!).

I remember the June daisies all along the highways, and I often picked bouquets for my house of these beautiful flowers. And, I used to watch for the blackberries to ripen in the hedgerows and fences; so delicious they were in cobblers and ice cream! or just plain, with cereal. Folk would often leave tomatoes on my little porch...or bell peppers from their gardens, and unshucked corn, and many types of squash; what a blessings all these gifts were for my single chair supper table! I loved the old drugstore in Cross Plains and the pharmacist, Doc, and his friendly crew behind the soda fountain. I enjoyed a drink there on hot, humid days...and plenty of good conversation (and I always wondered if he ever married that delightful lady in the area he dated and courted for so many years!).

For a Florida boy, our winter snow storms were a continual fascination...and with our altitude and high plateau location, we could have some nice snowfalls at times. I recall a lady in the community used to predict our snows...by the number of fogs in the late summer and early fall (maybe there was something to her observations which the weather people really did not know). And, I loved the way all the drivers on the roads would wave as they passed; it was a cheerful and affable gesture that I still find appealing and attractive. When I 'take a country road' anywhere ... even now, I still wave as I pass others on the pavement...a nice habit I learned in Cross Plains.

One day, in the farm shed out back of my house (next to the Yorkshire pigs, whom I found to be friendly and sociable!) I discovered an old butter churn. It was broken and in rather in derelict condition, but I took it out and cleaned it up. I was able to use the old brass rings and reassemble it...and shortly, I was able to display it in my small kitchen. In the meantime, I asked the family if I might buy it because I was very pleased to have found it. They graciously offered that I keep it as a gift; they had no interest in keeping it themselves. I still have this treasured antique in my house.

And, I keep my memories of Cross Plains lovingly, and with great appreciation for the lessons I learned and for the long-term friendships I formed while a member of your

remarkable congregation. I happily and gladly join with many in this time of remembrance and celebration. The Lord has blessed me to grant that I might be a small part of the spiritual success of the witness and ministry of the Church in Cross Plains. I will sing the hymns with you in this bright and pleasant season of joy and gratitude to God for His grace over these last fifty springs and summers, autumns and winters, as He has bent His mercy to shine upon you!

I close with the words of the Good Apostle Paul in his counsels to Timothy:

'That good thing which was committed unto thee, keep by the Holy Ghost which dwelleth in us.'

I thank the Good Lord over and over for the friendship and ministry you shared with me 45 years ago, at the time I began my work as a pastor,

Now he adds another four Waison important postscript!

I am enclosing a check also for the church congregation to use, however they wish.

If anyone is asking 'what I am doing now'...please let them know that I was in active congregational life for 22 years...then, the conference here asked me to work in trust services, which I did for 5 years. It was in 1989 that I transferred from the conference to LLU where I have been working now for nearly 20 years, as the director of planned giving. This has given me an interesting ministry...and, at the time I accepted, it was stated to me that the University wanted 'a pastor with experience in this position'. Well, I felt I could come, if that was the spiritual profile they needed and wanted.

Wanda has been working now for about 12 years with our medical alumni which has been very rewarding to her. Since she grew up in Loma Linda, she has known many of the old families here, the medical personnel, etc. Being at the reception desk and also answering the phone has put her in a very familiar stance...as she recognizes the graduates from the medical school from the 50s onward!

God's special blessings as you assist in this special occasion and celebration. My thoughts will be with you and all those who will assemble for the services of gratitude. Do let me know how it all transpires...and know that my thoughts will follow you. I count the time I spent there with you and the family, and all the gracious folk in the church...as my most precious (you were the first to welcome me into ministry, all on my own!). I was so very inexperienced and lacking in knowledge, but you all were so very patient and longsuffering with me; it was a treasured page in my life's story!

Congratulations on your 50th year as a Seventh-day Adventist Church serving the community of Cross Plains. I pastored for five years both the Ridgetop and Cross Plains churches. I well remember my good talks with Dr. Ramsey. After pastoring at Cross Plains, I went to be the youth leader for the Indiana Conference. Our lives took a turn when my then wife decided she wanted to be single. It took a few years to adjust from that. I learned a lot while being single, nine years of it. I learned that when an Advent minister becomes single he gets a lot of casseroles, pies, cakes and invitations to meet someone special as some will say "she is nice, real nice." Being single as a minister is not a good thing, but I rather enjoyed the contentment of being alone, not lonely. I went into professional healthcare chaplaincy from tha time on and am still there to this day. 





Busy Decade Leading to the 50th Anniversary of the Little Sanctuary

Elder Robert Korzyniowski, affectionately known as Pastor Bob, came as our 21st pastor. He and his wife Susan inspire us with their friendliness, love of Bible study and zeal for soul winning. They are leading us to that special landmark – 50 years of church organization.

Membership has fluctuated from the original 19 charter members to as high as 75 at one time.

In 1979 the conference office moved again. The present location is 850 Conference Drive, Goodlettsville, Tennessee.

Cross Plains may be considered a small church, but it has the warmth and friendliness of any size congregation. Sabbath School is well attended by all church members, and all classes maintain a good mission offering. The Senior and Youth appreciate the special features in the opening exercises and the well-planned lesson study by several different teachers during the quarter.

Linda Wells plans little extras to make Sabbath School for Cradle Roll and Kindergarten children special. She has recently redecorated the rooms with nature and Bible story themes.

Thelma Pitt always has a lively and challenging program for the Primary and Junior children. Her room is attractive and has recently acquired new upholstered chairs making the room comfortable and complete.

The members take an active part in the promotional activities of the world church. They also continue to assist in the support of the District church school at Ridgetop with the Love Offering taken each week by the children at the Children's Story time.

Paul Reynolds (aka Eddie) assumes a special interest in instigating many of the improvements seen over the recent years. He is also willing to spend time in the "problem areas": leaking or frozen pipes, or worn out plumbing, fading paint or any necessary replacements. 

kick start on the interior. Jeremy's younger brother, Josh, has been very involved in doorto-door witnessing, and we just love and appreciate these two young men.





The topic which most touched those present was Burden for Souls. There was a deep outpouring of emotion as members prayed for those who no longer attend church as well as those we seek to reach in the community.

The last night of prayer was on Friday, July 6. It was appropriate that the next day was a communion Sabbath. The members of Cross Plains have rededicated themselves to reaching their community with the message of a soon-coming Savior. 
Next, we had cards printed to put in the booklets that we handed out, that gave the recipients the opportunity to request more information or Bible studies, or to share a prayer request.




In 1902 Ellen White shared her thoughts as she remembered the struggles and final organization of the Seventh-day Adventist church in 1863 (145 years ago).
