2025 Idaho Conference Camp Meeting

You are warmly invited to join us for the 2026 Idaho Conference Camp Meeting, June 9–13, on the beautiful campus of Gem State Adventist Academy. Our theme this year, “Our Mission. My Commitment.”, reflects our shared calling to grow in faith, mission, service, and devotion to Jesus Christ. I eagerly look forward to this annual experience of worship, fellowship, inspiration, instruction, and friendship.

We are thrilled to welcome Dr. Michael Campbell as the speaker for the English-language evening meetings on Tuesday and Wednesday. Dr. Campbell serves the North American Division of Seventh-day Adventists as Director of the Archives, Statistics, and Research Department. A respected historian and former professor at Southwestern Adventist University, he has authored several books on Seventh-day Adventist history. A dynamic and engaging speaker, Dr. Campbell will lead us to God’s Word as we embrace the person and ministry of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

We are also excited that Elder Mark Finley will serve as the speaker for the English-language meetings from Thursday evening through Sabbath evening, including the Sabbath morning worship service. Well known throughout the Adventist Church as a gifted evangelist and preacher, Elder Finley will guide us to God’s Word with a focus on Jesus Christ as revealed in biblical prophecy.

For our Spanish-language Camp Meeting, we are delighted to welcome Elder Rubén Bullón, Associate Ministerial Director for the Illinois Conference, and Elder Rudy Salazar, Associate Director for Stewardship Ministries at the North American Division. Both are dynamic speakers who will lead us to the Written Word of God and the Living Word, Jesus Christ.

In addition to our evening meetings, several engaging daily meetings and seminars will be offered in the English-language. Dr. Denis Kaiser, professor at the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary at Andrews University, will present a seminar on the Trinity. Dr. Michael Campbell will teach Adventist History 101 and Ellen G. White 101, and Elder Rudy Salazar will present a seminar on biblical stewardship. Dr. Neil Nedley is our health speaker. We are pleased to offer an Adult Watercolor Painting Class, limited to twelve participants per session, taught by Julie Gee. Julie holds a BA in Art Education (K–12) with an emphasis in painting and is a gifted local artist. We will have a sanctuary exhibit with the Parma Church’s furniture on campus.

The Adventist Book Center (ABC) Auditorium Sale will take place Friday afternoon from 3:15–5:00. Guest Bios

Mark Finley and his wife, Ernestine “Teenie,” have teamed up in ministry throughout the years. Teenie is known worldwide for teaching natural lifestyle cooking. Together they have been involved in Christian ministry for over 40 years – preaching, teaching and offering spiritual growth workshops. They have conducted over 100 evangelistic series that have spanned the globe with sermons translated into over 50 languages. Today, Pastor Finley and Teenie continue their ministry at the Living Hope School of Evangelism Training Center in Haymarket, Virginia.



Michael W. Campbell, Ph.D., is director of the North American Division department of Archives, Statistics, and Research. He is an ordained minister who previously spent a decade in higher education in the Philippines and Texas. He is the co-editor of the *Oxford Handbook of Seventh-day Adventism*. He and co-author Edward Martin Allen just completed a book together entitled *A Global History of Seventh-day Adventists*, from Wm. B. Eerdmans Publishing Company. He has organized or collaborated on many regular research conferences within and outside the denomination. Some previous conference topics have focused on women in Adventist history, Creation care, and most recently, the development of beliefs and creeds, as well as anti-creedalism in church history. He contributes regularly to the *Sabbath School Rescue Podcast* and *The Ellen White Podcast*. Campbell is an engaging speaker and storyteller.



Elder Rudy Salazar is the Associate Director for Stewardship Ministries of the North American Division of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. He grew up in Tijuana, Mexico, and came to the United States when he was 20 years old. Elder Salazar received a bachelor’s degree from Union College in Lincoln, Nebraska. He also completed Master of Divinity and Doctorate in Pastoral Ministry degrees from Andrews University in Berrien Springs, Mich. He has pastored churches in Arizona, California, and Oregon. Elder Salazar also did Trust and Stewardship work in the Oregon, Texas, and Central California Conferences. He met his wife, Janet Baden, in Lincoln, Nebraska. They have been married for 40 years and have two adult children. Pastor Rudy likes cooking, hiking, ping-pong, and likes to play scrabble and many other table games.



Denis Kaiser, a native of Germany, is associate professor of church history in the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary at Andrews University in Berrien Springs, Mich. In 2017, he joined the Seminary faculty and received for his doctoral dissertation the Doctor of Philosophy Excellence in Research Award from the Seminary. He is fascinated by the interconnectedness of history and theology, particularly as it relates to the development of views on divine inspiration and the doctrine of God among Seventh-day Adventists. Besides contributing to academia, he is thoroughly convinced that academic research should be helpful to the church and shape one’s personal life. He currently serves as coeditor of the *Oxford Handbook of Seventh-day Adventism*, sub-editor of the history of theology and ethics articles for the *Encyclopedia of Seventh-day Adventists*, and annotation editor of *The Ellen G. White Letters & Manuscripts with Annotations*, vol. 2 (1860-1863). Denis is married to Angelika, a language instructor, and they have one daughter, Zoë.



Neil Nedley, MD, is founder and medical director of the community-based and residential Nedley Depression and



Anxiety Recovery Programs™ and Optimize Your Brain™. Dr. Nedley is an award-winning practicing physician who also serves as president of Weimar University, a higher education college that houses the NEWSTART program. He has presented and published numerous scientific studies in the medical/scientific literature and is well known as an author, public speaker, and teacher throughout the world.



Julie Gee has a BA in Art Education for grades K-12, with an emphasis in painting. She has taught art (drawing, painting, and ceramics) for grades nine to twelve, and has done Bible work and missionary work. She is currently a stay at home mom of three little ones. Rubén Bullón is a Christian pastor, leader, communicator, and author with extensive experience in ministry and in developing programs for spiritual formation, leadership, and personal growth. He currently serves as the director of Hispanic Ministries for the Illinois Conference, where he coordinates evangelism, mentoring, and pastoral training programs that impact dozens of communities in the United States and Latin America. Throughout his career, Pastor Bullón has combined his passion for teaching with a practical and compassionate approach to faith. His ministry is characterized by messages that integrate biblical reflection, emotional growth, and life

purpose, helping people develop a strong and meaningful spirituality. As an author, he has published several works focused on personal growth, identity, and faith applied to everyday life, including *You Don't Need Miracles*, *Being Happy*—which has sold over 200,000 copies—and *United Hearts*. His work aims to support people in processes of emotional healing, spiritual strengthening, and making conscious decisions.

Married to Leni Bullón, with whom he shares ministry and vision, he is the father of Julia and Laura, and dedicates his life to inspiring others to grow, serve, and live according to God's purpose.

Guidelines for a Safe Camp Meeting

Safety:

- Animals: No animals except service dogs are allowed on campus (which includes the RV Park). A service dog is individually trained to perform a specific task for a disability. (www.ada.gov/service_animals_2010.htm)
- Quiet Time: The cooperation of all campus residents and visitors is requested for quiet time in all residence areas of the campus between 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. daily.

Back to . . . Kindergarten?

All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten is the name of a book written by Robert Fulghum, published in 1986. The basis for the book is that all the really important things are the rules we learned in kindergarten. Things like being kind, sharing, cleaning up after ourselves are lessons learned that help us throughout our lives.

How does that impact our spiritual lives? For those who grew up in the Adventist Church, a lot of what we really needed to know about God we learned in Sabbath School, starting in Beginners and moving up through Youth. Solomon even said it in Proverbs 22:6, “Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it.”

Is it really that easy? Did we learn all we need to know about life in kindergarten? Did we learn all we need to know about God from Sabbath School? When my parents were baptized, I was Primary age, so I didn’t do Cradle Roll (Beginners) and Kindergarten Sabbath School. We had been Lutherans and when my parents left that church, we still had Sunday School at home.

In Primary and Juniors, what I remember most was singing and finding texts in the Bible. Our teacher would start reading a passage in the Bible, not telling us where it was found, and the first one to find it and start reading it got to start the next round. It was a fun way to learn where stories and other things were in the Bible. It kept us engaged, made the Bible fun. Through the stories we read, we learned how God wanted us to live.

Looking at what is happening in the world today, and even in the church, maybe we need to all go back to kindergarten, in school and in Sabbath School. Maybe we need a refresher on how God wants us to live with the people around us. The people who, like us, are His children. I’m not saying that we can make the whole world kinder, more like what heaven will be like. But we can make the circle around us kinder. And as those in our circle are affected, they in turn can impact their circle. None of us live in just one circle. We touch so many other lives!

Something Jesus said in Matthew 18:3 should resonate with us today: “Truly, I say to you, unless you turn and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.” The disciples had asked, “who was the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?” What if we became like children? I think becoming like a child is learning to be teachable. Children learn an incredible amount in school. Along with academics, they learn how to treat others, learn how to be a friend.

There has been a meme going around for years of two little boys, telling their teacher that they are twins because they have the same haircut. When you look at the picture, one is dark-skinned while the other is light-skinned. Definitely not what we would consider twins. But to them, skin color didn’t matter. They hadn’t learned about prejudice yet.

I challenge each of us to become like children, finding the things that make us twins. Going back to kindergarten and children’s Sabbath School and learning how to be teachable again. Being kind, sharing with others. Learning how much Jesus loves every one of His children.

There’s a hymn titled *I Would Be Like Jesus* with the refrain: “Be like Jesus, this my song, In the home and in the throng; Be like Jesus, all day long! I would be like Jesus.” Sounds like a good motto for our lives.
